There are not enough words to express our gratitude to all of you for your loving care of our precious husband, father and grandfather, Guido Blasetti.


Your capable care, your caring hearts and your encouraging smiles and words are all gifts you gave to Guido and our family.


We're In The News!

Carewest Computer Replacement Moves Forward

ITS is in year two of a three-year Macintosh computer replacement project. During the first year we replaced 55 Macs with Compaq PCs (personal computers), approximately 20 aging Apple laser printers were replaced with new Hewlett Packard laser printers and about 90 people were trained across Carewest. So far this summer we have replaced about 55 of 65 Macs with the help of our summer student Jordan Wilson who has been busy and proficient. We've held training sessions at each site to ensure users are comfortable with their new PCs and even though there have been a few 'gotchas', overall the project has gone very smoothly and people are pleased with their new computer systems.


The Infection Prevention and Control Committee (IP&C) would like **you** to design a poster to promote our Influenza Vaccine Campaign this year.
