

New Security Service for Carewest

After analyzing key security needs and reviewing available options, Carewest has decided to purchase security services from Calgary Health Region. The new out-sourced service came into effect on December 1, 2002.

What Security Services Are Provided?

- On-site security officer shared by Dr. Vernon Fanning and George Boyack / Cross Bow sites seven days a week. Will have radio contact with and back-up support by fellow security officers.
- **Nightly mobile patrol** at Signal Pointe, Royal Park, Sarcee, and Glenmore Park sites. Will include a complete foot patrol of the perimeter of the building and contact with 'Most Responsible Person'.
- Urgent mobile patrol response to all sites (excluding current Colonel Belcher) 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. If you are in imminent danger, call
 911. If you have an unfolding security situation but are not in imminent danger, call the Control Centre at 943-3430.
- Closer link between Glenmore Park site and Rockyview Hospital Security Services. Will make random unannounced visits to the Glenmore Park site and become familiar with grounds, buildings and staff. If you are in imminent danger at Glenmore Park, call 911. If you have an unfolding security situation at Glenmore Park but are not in imminent danger, call the Control Centre at 943-3430 to access Rockyview Hospital Security Services.
- Education sessions with front line Carewest staff conducted by Calgary Health Region Protection Services. Immediate focus will be Personal Awareness Safety and Security (P.A.S.S.) and Introduction to 'Non Violent Crisis Intervention'. (Note: until Carewest can begin scheduling the P.A.S.S. sessions, site management and site health and safety committees will be reviewing strategies for avoiding or minimizing potentially dangerous situations with staff.)
- Site security audits conducted by Calgary Health Region Protection Services. Will focus on 'Certified Protection through Environmental Design' and is expected to be completed within a six-month period.

What Does the New Service Accomplish?


- Assistance with improvement of overall security controls, systems, and practices

Update from the Infection Prevention & Control Department Regarding the Norwalk, Virus



Norwalk, recently dubbed the 'cruise ship virus', has docked in Calgary. Media reports suggest that more than 1000 Calgarians have been diagnosed with the gastrointestinal virus, including some Carewest residents and staff.

"There have been several cases of Norwalk at Carewest sites and we're following specific outbreak management policies and procedures to control it," explains Mary LeBlanc, Infection Prevention and Control Coordinator for Carewest. "The most important thing everyone can do is wash their hands thoroughly and avoid contact with others if they are sick. We have many visitors during the holiday season and we are strongly encouraging people to delay their visit if they suspect they are not well. This should always be the rule that visitors should follow."

What is Norwalk?

Norwalk virus and Norwalk-like viruses are a family of viruses that cause gastrointestinal infections. These intestinal illnesses often occur in outbreaks. It was first identified in 1972 after an outbreak of gastrointestinal illness in Norwalk, Ohio. It is found world-wide.

What are Norwalk symptoms?

Symptoms are mild to moderate and usually appear within 24 to 48 hours of exposure to the virus. They range from nausea to vomiting, and/or diarrhea and abdominal cramps. Some people also experience abdominal pain and headache. Symptoms usually last between 24 to 48 hours. A person with Norwalk is infectious for up to 48 hours after the symptoms are gone. This is why it is so important for staff to stay away for 48 hours after they are better.

What is the treatment?

Norwalk does not usually require medical treatment but it's important to drink plenty of fluids to avoid dehydration. Fatalities are rare.

How does Norwalk spread?

The virus is spread through direct contact with infected persons and by eating or drinking contaminated food and water. It commonly strikes schools, long term care facilities and cruise ships.

How can you prevent/control it?

Wash your hands thoroughly and frequently with soap and warm water (even if you wear gloves), especially when you enter or leave a care facility. You can supplement your hand washing with the use of alcohol antiseptic products. Anyone experiencing symptoms should avoid working with or visiting the elderly or ill people for at least 48 hours after they are well. Contaminated surfaces should be cleaned then disinfected with household chlorine bleach-based cleansers.





Education Update

A suggestion was made at one of **Brenda Huband's** Town-Hall Forums to have a regular staff education update. Thank you to who ever made that suggestion, as it is a wonderful opportunity to highlight the education sessions we have booked for the coming weeks. We plan to make this a regular feature in future editions of *Carewrite*.

Orientation Week

Orientation will be Monday January 13, 2003. During orientation week new staff attend "Day One" where they hear an overview to Carewest and all the services we provide. They have presentations from the Wellness Department, Scheduling, Infection Prevention and Control. Our Education Associates Corina Grover and Nichole Pardell (nee Boone) provide an orientation to the mandatory education topics: emergency codes; Protection of People in Care; WHMIS, etc.

On Tuesday January 14 from 12:30 pm to 3:15 pm (at Fanning Center Conference Room #2) we offer the new licensed practical nurses (LPNs) and registered nurses (RNs) an overview to our medication delivery system and an orientation to processing physicans' orders and a review of Health Information Act and Blood and Body Fluid expose procedures.

On either Wednesday or Thursday of orientation week we offer a full day classroom orientation to documentation and clinical skills review. Exactly where and when we offer this day depends on the number of new staff we hire and where they will be working. All our Education Resource Nurses teach this content.

If any of you would like a refresher on any of this information, please contact Jen Schulz, Education Services Secretary at 267-2910, but please first talk with your Program Leader if you want to be paid for attending.

Education Sessions

Program Education. Each month we offer either Lifestyle Choices or Supportive Pathways education. January we will offer Supportive Pathways on Tuesday January 21 (part 1) and January 28 (part 2) both at Signal Pointe. If you work in this program and have not attended these sessions yet, PLEASE discuss this with your Program Leader.

Pain as the Fifth Vital Sign is a 30 minute

session for all care staff offered by Kathleen Davidson from the region. This session highlights the importance of assessing pain in the residents, including those with dementia. In January Kathleen will be coming to Sarcee and Royal Park (on the 9th) and Fanning (likely on the 10th). These sessions will be held on the units, so check for posters in your sites for the exact locations and times.

Safe Food Handling. ALL Care staff who have ANYTHING to do with helping residents eat, or who handle food preparation on the units (e.g., cookie making) need to attend this two-and-a-half hour session offered by Environmental Services from the region. Food Services staff also need this session. We have booked the following sessions: January 16 at Fanning; January 17 at Cross Bow; January 30 at Sarcee and possibly January 31 at Glenmore. All these sessions will be from 1:00 pm to 3:30 pm. Please book with Jen Schultz (267-2910) to attend this session (again, after talking to your Program Leader).



Education Sessions (cont'd)

Cooks and staff who run meal preparation programs for residents need to attend the two-day 'Section 43 Food Safe' Course. This course costs \$100 and you register by contacting Environmental Health at 943-8030. Discuss this more in-depth course with your leader prior to registering.

Outbreak Management. Okay, sometimes you plan education that is 'too late' for real life. In October, we thought January might be a good time to have Mary LeBlanc offer sessions for staff on "how to recognize and manage an outbreak". This content should have been covered earlier this year (we promise to be do better next year!). There will be three in-services offered in January. Keep an eye out for posters with the 'where and when' details.

Personal Safety. Comprehensive Community Care (C3) will be offering a session on personal safety on January 16 offered by Calgary Police Service from 2:00 pm to 3:30 pm at Sarcee. Although this session is geared primarily to staff from C3 who provide care in residents' homes, there may be some space for other Carewest staff who also go to people's homes for in-home assessments. Please contact Jen Schultz (267-2910) to register for this session.

For the rest of our staff, starting in January we will arrange regular **Personal Awareness and Safety and Security** (PASS) sessions. These will be offered by our new security company and will focus on being aware of your personal safety and what you can do to stay as safe as possible. Check for posters at your sites for dates and locations.

Team Effectiveness. Each of our care service teams has experienced a significant change in staff during the month of November. To help teams reestablish themselves, we have produced a 'team barometer' to help teams track their progress through the stages from 'forming' and 'norming' to 'storming' and 'performing' (and hopefully not too often, but, 'mourning' as staff leave teams).

Program Leaders will be covering the content of the Team Effectiveness sessions with the staff on their teams in small doses at each of their team meetings. This way we help teams work together and offer the new staff the content in 'small pieces' and the 'old-timers' get a chance to review some team-effectiveness content.

Palliative Care Team and Pharmacy will continue their 'Core Curriculum' series in January (dates and locations are being finalized).

Site Specific Education. Each month the Education Resource Nurses arrange in-services at the sites to address the learning needs of the staff. In January look for sessions in your sites on Blood Glucose Monitoring (RN and LPN); Hypodermoclysis (RN and LPN); Blood Pressure Reviews (NAs) as well as a multitude of other interesting topics. Check for posters on upcoming coming education sessions as well as the Education Calendar that is posted each month for your site.



Carewest Forms Committee

Did you know that Carewest has a Forms Committee? This committee was developed to regulate and oversee form development and maintenance throughout Carewest. The committee meets every few months and here are just some of the things that the Committee does:

- Assists Carewest staff to develop new forms that support charting/documentation and helps aid discussion across the many specialty areas to ensure we are not duplicating the data collection process.
- Ensures a standard design for all forms. These include things like the Carewest Logo and the use of plain language.
- Ensures that legal and legislative requirements are met (e.g., the Health Information Act).
- Monitors the ordering, distribution and warehousing of our forms. By partnering with Data Business forms we can better monitor forms usage and distribution to ensure the most cost effective process for Carewest. All of the ordering is done via the Internet and this enables the user to monitor and track their orders at any
- Regularly reviews the catalogue of forms to minimize duplication and to ensure forms are reviewed at least annually.

How Do You Create or Revise a Form?

- 1. A unit or service area creates a form to support care or service process.
- 2. They get feedback from staff who will be using the form (sometimes the draft form is trialed for a period of time to work out any problems/issues).
- 3. Form is forwarded to the Forms Committee.
- 4. Form is reviewed by the appropriate group (e.g., Rehab and Recovery forms are reviewed by the Rehab & Recovery Committee) and the form is assessed for any impact to policies or services.
- 5. Information Management reviews the form for any privacy or legal issues.
- 6. Forms Committee reviews the form and approves if appropriate.
- 7. Committee goes to DATA to produce a proof.
- 8. Proof is approved by the unit or service area.
- Form is put into warehouse and is ready for ordering.


