Almost 200 people attended the official opening of Royal Park on Friday, November 27th. Royal Park is Alberta's first combined continuing care centre and private rental apartment complex for seniors. The building is beautifully designed and decorated to have the "look and feel" of home.

Special guests included the Honorable Halvar Jonson Minister of Health, Dr. John Morgan Chair CRHA Board, Alderman Barry Erskine, Donna Rose Chair Carewest Board, Frank Boyd President Apex Land Corporation, Paul Rushforth Chief Operating Officer CRHA, Jocelyne Burgener MLA, Marlene Raasok Chief Operating Officer CHR, and Gary Durbeniuk Chief Executive Officer, Calgary Health Trust.

One of the highlights of the afternoon came during the ribbon cutting ceremony. Mr. and Mrs. Alf Anderson both in their mid eighties took part helping to cut the blue and white ribbon. Mr. Anderson, who is currently a resident of Carewest Cross Bow will soon be moving into Carewest Royal Park while his wife Roberta will occupy one of the rental apartments above. In her welcoming remarks, Donna Rose Carewest Board Chair noted that keeping couples together reflects the spirit of Royal Park.





# CAREWEST CROSS BOW NEWS UPDATE

As reported in the October 30th issue of the Carewrite, plans are proceeding as scheduled to reduce the number of Cross Bow beds from 98 to 80. The November transfer of staff to Royal Park and other Carewest sites began with a farewell tea party at Cross Bow on November 12th for 10 staff members. Resident transfers to Royal Park will follow in December. Thanks to some careful juggling of rotation schedules no staff have been displaced from positions. The opening of 50 new beds at Royal Park and the reduction of only 18 beds at Carewest Cross Bow results in a net gain of 32 additional Long Term Care beds within the Calgary Region.

**Far from slowing down, Cross Bow continues to hum with activity**. In addition to business as usual, Cross Bow is offering three private rooms as much needed respite beds. These rooms are available for temporary stays of as long as two months for seniors requiring care within either Supportive Pathways or Capable Seniors programs. Family members and caregivers are most grateful for this essential service.

#### **ACTIVITY HIGHLIGHTS**

- ♦ On Monday October 26th Cross Bow hosted a casual **Open House Tea Party** in the Day Services area providing a social occasion for all past and present employees (regular staff directly affected by the Cross Bow transition) to receive the Commemorative gift they had previously chosen, either a bone china plate or a sweat shirt with the Cross Bow crest. Staff took the opportunity to visit with Site Leader Marg Marlin and other friends and enjoy the goodies provided by the Food Service department.

DID YOU KNOW ...

Social workers often help individuals and families deal with issues related to changes; Medical Social Workers are part of the team at the Carewest Day Hospitals. Change is a leading cause of stress in our society. Change occurs in every day life for a variety of reasons, both good and bad. When an individual develops health problems or has a medical crisis, change within the family unit can occur on a number of different levels. A parent may become dependent on children for assistance with "functional abilities;" a husband may have to relinquish driving or banking responsibilities; a wife may not be able to participate in homemaking. These are changes in family roles. Coping with these changes and adjusting to new roles can be challenging and occasionally frustrating.

# Carewest seeks expressions of interest for new care housing development

The Calgary Regional Health Authority (CRHA) has identified the need to expand the continuing care capacity throughout our region. The Region is inviting continuing care and housing providers and developers to participate in an Expression Of Interest process. As part of this process, the CRHA has invited Carewest to find out if there are private or not-for-profit organizations that might be interested in joining with us to develop an integrated seniors living community that will include ap-

proximately 130 continuing care beds. Royal Park is one example of this type of partnership. We developed this project together with Apex Land Corporation.

To find out if there are any organizations interested in co-developing a seniors housing community, Carewest will place an advertisement in the papers next week. This advertisement is called an Expression Of Interest. In order for the process to be as fair as possible, all interested organizations have to go

through a strict, confidential, step by step process. If you are asked by a developer or anybody else who is involved in the Expression Of Interest for information, please refer the inquiry immediately to Betty McCaig, Executive Secretary at 267-2912. All inquiries will be forwarded to Guy Buchanan, a consultant who is assisting Carewest with the process. Guy is a former Carewest Board member (1985 - 88) and has extensive experience in the development industry. He is currently the President of Co-Star Consulting Ltd.


