

With Spring coming on, we decided Carewrite needed a facelift. We hope you like the look of our new front page!



Welcome to Sally's Kitchen!

Featuring Sally Salonka of Carewest Cross Bow's Baking Program

Among Sally Salonka's first quilting projects was one of the most difficult quilting patterns called "Grandmother's Flower Garden." Each little six sided piece was painstakingly sewn to the next one by hand, a testimony to the patience and attention to detail with which Sally approaches life.

At Carewest Cross Bow, Sally spends a lot of time in the kitchen — "Sally's Kitchen." (Look for the beautiful hand painted sign on the door!). Tuesday and Thursday mornings, she is there at 9:00, pulling ingredients out of the cupboards in the large bright room. When a recipe has been chosen and the utensils laid out on the table, Sally brings down her enthusiastic group of residents. Most of them have baked before, and the familiar measuring, stirring and spooning out seems to bring back good

memories. "I feel that it's a really important program for the residents," Sally tells me. "For a lot of the ladies, it makes them realize they can still do something they used to do. We even have a few of the men attending now, and admitting that they used to do some baking."

The atmosphere in the kitchen is comfortable and happy. Sally moves gently from one resident to another, giving each one a chance to measure and stir, chatting affectionately and helping frail hands as the dough gets hard to stir. Ed, one of the residents, sings to us as he waits his turn. "When will the cookies be done?" he asks between serenades. "You can't get cookies as good as these in a store, you know."

Sally is a busy lady. Over the last ten years, her reputation as a quilter has grown. Now other quilters commission her to do the decorative quilting stitches on their completed quilt tops. One of these projects included 250 hours of hand sewing a complicated pattern on a king sized quilt. Lately, she's begun to experiment with machine quilting. In addition to her baking program at Carewest George Boyack, Sally is secretary of the volunteer association at Carewest Cross Bow, and works two mornings a week as a church secretary. Thanks Sally, for 16 years of volunteering and dozens and dozens of delicious cookies and muffins!



News from the Carewest Development Council


We will be introducing the members of the Carewest Development Council, starting with this issue of Carewrite. The Carewest Development Council raises funds to enhance the quality of life for those served by Carewest.

Gerald Pittman, Q.C. Chairman of the Carewest Development Council

About 10 years ago, Gerald Pittman's family needed help caring for their father. Carewest (District 7) stepped in, providing the necessary homecare and making everyone's life so much easier. "It was like a miracle," he says. Shortly afterward, he volunteered to serve on Carewest's board and has been there ever since, presently as Chairman of the Carewest Development Council.

The board has seen a lot of changes during these years, Gerald says, and some have been painful. But they've been lucky to retain knowledgeable board members from the past to help see them through the transitional times, while still attracting new members.

Since regionalization, the board's role includes more responsibility for fundraising. They formed the Carewest Foundation to help accomplish this. (The Foundation has now merged with the Calgary Health Trust, and Gerald is a member, as Chair of the Carewest Development Council.) The staff and volunteers at Carewest always work hard to support fundraisers, such as Fun(D) Fest, but some new ventures will involve board members more directly, he says. "We will be asking people and corporations for money—something a lot of people don't like to do, but it is very important now and will be more important as time goes on. We are all getting older and we are all going to need more of this type of care."

Gerald's law practice keeps him very busy, but he somehow still finds time to volunteer with two other organizations, in addition to Carewest. He is a board member for the Canadiana Fund, which raises money to furnish the seven official residences in Ottawa and Quebec City. "These buildings have been neglected and a lot of the historic furniture is gone," he says, "so we are trying to find some of these artifacts and put them back." He also works with the Canadian Friends of the British Museum, helping to raise funds for the museum and organize exchanges with museums in Canada. These are fun things that go along with his interest in antiques, he says. "I'm a Collector Magpie (a frustrated antique dealer!) and a flea market junkie—I've done that for years and years."

Any parting thoughts? "Carewest has an outstanding reputation for longterm care," Gerald Pittman says. "They are lucky to have so many enthusiastic employees at the helm."
