THE LATEST NEWS ON STAFF SCHEDULING AND RECRUITMENT AT CAREWEST

Getting the *right people to the right* place at the right time is an important priority for Carewest. Last year, we brought you news about the organization's efforts to make improvements in this area. Like most changes in large, complex organizations, it takes a lot of careful planning and pain staking work.

Here's where the Staffing, Scheduling and Recruitment project sits to date:

A Steering Committee and two sub-committees (Rotations and Policies/Procedures) were formed with staff and management from a variety of departments and services. The Rotation Sub Committee headed by Jim Townend has defined the following goals and principles to improve staff rotations. Here they are:

Rotation Principles

- Residents needs will be met.
- An understanding that we have equal and fair standards throughout Carewest.
- Consistency of care provided by the same group of people working on a unit.
- Rotations designed to meet budget requirements.

Rotation Goals

- Meaningful work for all employees, which is defined at .5 to .7 FTE.
- Not working short.
- Enabling staff to have annual vacation and named holiday time off.
- No more than two start times in a rotation.
- Maximum number of weekends off. (One off in two would be best).

With these goals and principles in mind, committee members are evaluating rotations at Carewest and other outside organizations. So far, they have not found a rotation that meets all of the above goals. In other words, there is no 'one size fits all' rotation that provides both equal weeks worked and off, prevents long stretches of work or gives two days off in a row. One of the ways to meet some of these requirements is to build in statutory holidays. Committee member Liz Sherman (scheduling) is currently exploring a rotation that "looks pretty good". She'll be reporting back to the group once she's gathered all the information.

Meanwhile, Bob Gerst consultant for the Staffing, Scheduling and Recruitment Project is working with the University of Calgary's Pacific Institute of Math Sciences to work out our rotation requirements. The Pacific Institute is a

Federal Remittance Changes for 1999

Canada Pension Plan (CPP)	3.2%	increased to	3.5%
Employment Insurance (EI)	2.7%	decreased to	2.55%

We will be paying more in Canada Pension Plan contributions for 1999. At the same time, however, we will be paying less in employment insurance deductions. In summary, the amounts deducted for each of the Federal remittances have changed from last year and in the end it will most likely cost us more.



Staff profile

Paul Bowers and Tony Elizardo: Meeting their heroes every day

Paul and Tony, Fabrication
Technicians in the Seating Clinic at
Carewest Dr. Vernon Fanning
Centre, have that well tuned,
sometimes wordless way of
communicating that comes from
years of working well together.
They sit before me, finishing each
other's sentences and taking turns
jumping up to help people who
come to the door. "We're a team,"
says Paul Bowers. "... and I can't

imagine doing this job alone," adds Tony Elizardo.

Tony began working at the Seating Clinic 12 years ago, when it was still at the General Hospital, and Paul joined him five years later. Both men stayed on board when the clinic moved to Fanning two years ago. "It was a smooth transition," Tony says, "and we're happy to be here."

"Here" is the large basement shop where custom wheelchairs are created for clients throughout Southern Alberta, including people from continuing care centres, group homes and private homes. On the surface, the chairs often look the same, but each one, custom upholstered and assembled from over a dozen components, is highly individualized for its owner. "Our clients sometimes sit 14–15 hours a day," Tony says. "... so they need something comfortable that they can tolerate for that length of time," Paul adds.

Every Thursday, Paul and Tony take turns attending an assessment clinic, as part of a team that includes a physiotherapist and occupational therapist. The team meets with each client and considers their lifestyle, abilities, and how they move and sit. They also consider the needs of caregivers and family who help the clients. Then they take the body measurements necessary for building a custom chair.

Back in the workshop, Paul and Tony begin with a stripped wheelchair frame; and the assessment information, they construct as much of the custom chair as possible before the client's next visit. The fine-tuning takes place when the client comes for his final fitting. These appointments are often two to three hours long, a long wait for people with certain medical conditions. This is when teamwork really improves efficiency. Paul, Tony and their assistant, Rose Koziel, are all able to work on different components of the chair at the same time, so that people don't have to wait as long.

Both men love the creative, hands-on aspect of their work, but what really keeps them going is working with their clients and helping them improve their lives. We gain insight from being with our clients, they tell me. Seeing how much some people have to cope with sure has a way of putting your own problems in perspective. "People say there are no heroes around anymore, but that's not true," Tony says. "We see them all the time."

Any parting thoughts? They are silent for a few moments, then Paul speaks out: "It would be great if they could discover a cure for MS that would help put us out of business."

non-profit group whose members provide math solutions to business and industries. These math gurus are willing to test out our rotation requirements mathematically by building a computer based program specially designed for Carewest.

The Policy and Procedures group, headed by Human Resources Leader Blair Phillips, is working on Vacation policy and Leave of Absence standards. As a result of his committee's work, vacation calendars are now posted twice a year to improve vacation planning and staffing. Blair reports that vacation administration is going well this year with fewer cases of working short over the summer.

This committee is also working on staffing, filling vacancies, how to use relief staff effectively by sites and on standards for shift swaps. Meetings were held with staff and leader groups to bring them up to date and to let them know about possible changes. The committee is drafting polices for review in January. Once the Policy and Procedures committee has reviewed the policies, they will be circulated to all Leaders and staff to be reviewed.

The most important — and challenging — step will be putting the paper work into practice! This will call for lots of information sharing and understanding.



Barbara Burns, Nursing Attendant at Carewest Cross Bow, has been helping some residents to design and build a Doll House. Everything in the house, the ideas, the materials used in the construction of the house and all the items in it form a tapestry of shared memories of staff and residents alike and so it is called "Remembrance House."

With staff assisting, residents braid fine miniature rugs, make pictures for the walls, create hardwood floors from tongue depressors, upholster chairs, make blinds and paper walls. Tickle Your Keyboard Ease work-related pain with a lighter touch

Anyone who spends long hours at a keyboard is at risk for carpal tunnel syndrome, tendinitis, and other Work Related Upper Extremity Disorders (WRUEDs). But there's a key (no pun intended) to lowering your risk, say experts, and here it is: **Lighten up!**

When researchers used special equipment to measure how hard a group of office workers hit the keys when they typed on computers, they noticed two things. First, everyone used much more force than necessary — four or five times more, on average, than was needed for the keystrokes to register. Second, those who used the most force had the strongest symptoms of WRUEDs (*Journal of Occupational and Environmental Medicine*, December 1997).

It is possible to learn to tap the keyboard instead of pounding it, says study author Michael Feuerstein, Ph.D., professor at The Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in Bethesda, MD. His suggestions:

Practice typing with a light touch. Post reminders where you can see them as you work. **Identify your "triggers."** You may tend to type harder when you're tired, hurried, or under stress, for example. Pay extra attention to your keyboard force at those times.

Check your posture. Keep your wrists relaxed but not bent upward or downward. Be sure that your monitor is at eye level. Correct any problems that put you in an awkward posture.

Cut back on the caffeine. "It's just speculation," says Dr. Feuerstin, "but drinking too many caffeinated beverages could translate into increased tension that might relate to increased force when using the keyboard."

Listen to your body. Pain, aches, stiffness, burning, tingling, or numbing in your hands, wrists, arms, or shoulders "are signals that something may not be right," says Dr. Feuerstein. See your doctor or an occupational therapist amd you may avoid more serious injury later.
