

STRATEGIC PLANNING MINI CONFERENCE GREAT SUCCESS!

A grand total of 85 participants took part in Carewest's first Strategic Planning Mini Planning Conference on May 31, 1999. The purpose of the conference, held at Carewest Dr. Vernon Fanning Centre, was to generate as much input as possible in planning Carewest's future.

The all-day conference included Carewest employees, board members, community representatives, residents, family members and volunteers. Following a welcoming message from Board Chair Donna Rose, delegates listened to Elaine Gallagher, Ph.D., talk about issues surrounding the future of long term care.

Marlene Raasok explained Carewest's role in the Calgary Regional Health Authority's planning strategy followed by Roger Sauve from Statistics Canada who talked about social, economic and health trends.

Armed with plenty of food for thought, delegates then broke into small groups to discuss issues impacting the future of Carewest. These issues were then distilled into major themes and possible outcomes. "The results from this conference will provide Carewest with valuable information as we move forward with our strategic planning process," explained

Mike Conroy, Executive Leader. "We are most fortunate to have the suggestions and insights of those we serve as well as the community at large." Broad representation is also part of the Carewest Frame of Reference Mike noted. We value community awareness, partnerships, and the contribution of volunteers in order to respond to customer needs.

Next steps? Management Partners will review the information collected at the Mini Conference. They will then use this information to form the foundation of Carewest's Strategic Planning.



QUALITY IMPROVEMENT HAPPENING EVERYDAY AT CAREWEST GLENMORE PARK

Staff members of the Supportive Pathways Program at Carewest Glenmore Park are giving a whole new meaning to the words 'service improvement,' explains Program Leader Marlene Collins.

Once a month each staff member on the three units must come up with an improvement for delivering care or services. At staff meetings the team members go through all the suggestions and select two or three to implement. It's not an involved or difficult undertaking, Marlene notes. It's simply a case of jotting down ideas on a flip chart. Here are some examples:

- Ideas to reduce noise levels on the units especially at meal
- Decorating ideas for making the units more homelike.
- Improving customer service to families by making a point of saying hello and welcoming them to the unit.

 Showing each other more respect and sharing the work load.

As a result of these improvement suggestions, Marlene says they are now using the resident's own bath sheets for baths on 2 south. "The bath sheet is part of the resident's personal belongings and as such is laundered with their clothing. The night before the resident's bath, the bath sheet is put in the blanket warmer so it's cozy for after the bath."


1999 Seniors' Resource Fair a big success

UPDATE ON THE InfoCARE PROJECT

Well, although things have been quiet for our Clinical Working group in the last few months, a separate group has been evaluating responses from six different vendor groups. In December we sent out a Request for Information asking these vendors to tell us what their software could do in terms of gathering MDS 2.0 Resident Assessment information, identifying areas that need to be care planned, producing a care plan specific for each resident and producing different reports to help our care teams care for our residents. An evaluation committee was struck to review the responses, each vendor was graded according to specific criteria and four vendors were selected to demonstrate their software. These demonstrations will be taking place from June 21-30, and we have

invited not only our Clinical Working Committee, Program Leaders and Management Partner group to participate but also all the other care centres in the region, groups from Edmonton and Lethbridge as well as representatives from CHR (Community Health Resources), Transition Services and Homecare.

On June 21st, we will be hosting a General Information session for everyone to let them know about our project, hear an update from the Region, the Alberta Outcomes project, Alberta Wellnet project as well as a mini-lecture about the MDS 2.0 Resident Assessment Instrument from Dr. Colleen Maxwell from the University of Calgary.

Once all the demonstrations are complete the evaluation committee will compile the results of the demonstration evaluations and try to choose the final one or two vendors. I will be sure and keep you posted as we move through this process.

VoicePrint -- A Special Service for the blind, vision restricted and senior audiences

VoicePrint, Canada's broadcast reading service for blind, vision-restricted, and senior audiences moved quietly into Alberta last fall, and has been gaining momentum ever since.

Aired on cable television, volunteers at VoicePrint read news stories, columns and editorials from Alberta's major newspapers. These broadcasts become part of the national VoicePrint reading network.

The Alberta news reports are heard at 2 p.m., with repeats at 10

p.m. and 5 a.m. Monday to Friday. The CRTC-licensed program service is on the air 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. It features international, national, business, sports, health and leisure, and Canadian regional news rounds-ups, now including Alberta.

VoicePrint is a division of NBRS, the National Broadcast Reading Service, a non-profit organization that provides a variety of audio services to Canadians with vision restrictions.

Its goal is to serve the thousands of

Canadians who cannot read or physically handle a newspaper, because of sight difficulties, aging or health problems.

"We are helping people enjoy life on an equal footing," says Bureau Chief Lynne Rach. "Seniors with dimming vision tell us that they miss being able to read their newspaper almost as much as losing the ability to see the faces of their grandchildren."


It's back again - the 4th Annual Carewest Fun(D) Fest!

Take Care When Faxing!

It's easy to send confidential information to the wrong number. So take great care when faxing. Here are some tips to remember:

- First of all, decide whether it is necessary to fax the information. If it's not needed right away, you may want to send it some other way.
- If you are not sure about the fax number, phone to make sure it's correct.
- Make sure the fax is received on the other end.
- Be sure to complete a Fax Transmission Cover Sheet.
- When dialing, confirm the number being dialed with the fax machine display. If it's a number that is used frequently, use the automatic dialing feature.
- If a fax number should change, make sure the new number is registered in the automatic feature.
- If the information is going to a public area, make sure someone is there to receive it.

Float Holiday Update

Regular and some temporary full – time Carewest employees (depending on date of hire, collective agreements, etc.) are entitled to one "Float Holiday" each year. As a general rule, this day must be taken within a certain time frame usually ending by December 31st of each year.

Please refer to your collective agreement or non-union policy to make sure you are aware of the specific details regarding your entitlement. Also, please be very specific when you apply for this day to ensure it is coded and recorded properly. You can also verify the coding on your pay stub to ensure it is correct.
