Carewest buses have been delivering door-to-door service for the last three weeks picking up staff and taking them home at the end of their shifts. The buses run from 5:30 a.m. to 12:30 a.m. seven days a week, transporting 35 to 45 staff every day.

Kel Czernick, Team Leader Client Services/Bus Operations, says organizing the bus service is a lot of work but well worth the effort. "It's keeping us hopping, juggling the trips, but staff are most appreciative. Although we have had to cancel regular bus programs, our residents are most appreciative that staff are coming to work. There have been no complaints," he said. Kel cautions that the free service is available for people who have absolutely no other way of getting to work. The service has been made possible with the support of Human Resources, in particular Janet Miles, Corina Grover, Susan Poynter and Blair Phillips – and of course our hard-working bus drivers.

As we prepare to celebrate National Social Work Week from March 18 to 24, we encourage you to call or drop by your social workers office to learn more about social work services at Carewest.




as her extended family. Lene volunteers because she loves people and enjoys brightening their

Colonel Belcher Care Centre News

(New Project Development)



Meet Brenda Huband, another member of the Colonel Belcher Care Centre Project Advisory Committee. Brenda is the Site Leader for Carewest Sarcee, Royal Park and Signal Pointe. She is also the **Integration Leader** of the Colonel Belcher-Carewest Transition Committee.

Planning and building Royal Park have given Brenda the experience of working with a public-private partnership. Royal Park was built as a partnership between Carewest and Apex Lifestyle Communities. Now, with the Colonel Belcher Care Centre (CBCC) project, Carewest and Apex are once again collaborating to build an even bigger facility. Several members at the planning table were involved with Royal Park — representatives from Carewest and Apex, Stantec (architects) and the construction company Summa Management. This shared history has enabled the project advisory committee to move ahead confidently. By involving the operations team for the new CBCC at the beginning of this project, Brenda says the committee is confident the end

result will be a centre that meets the needs of both veterans and seniors in the community.

Brenda says her experience as a Site Leader allows her to speak knowledgeably about Carewest while carrying out the transition plan with CBVCC staff. She has an understanding of the key areas within Carewest, including Finance, Human Resources, and Materials Management. As such, she can answer questions and concerns from staff. As a Management Partner at Carewest, Brenda says she wouldn't be able to attend to the work involved in the transition planning process without the back up of her colleagues. The support of the rest of the management team is invaluable to her.

When you ask Brenda the obvious question, "How do you do all that you do, including overseeing Royal Park, Sarcee and Signal Pointe?" she says, "I compartmentalize. When I move from work to home, my priorities change, and I'm able to focus on my family, and vice versa." Brenda and her husband Derrick keep busy with sports and activities involving their eight-year-old son Chris. She loves to spend time in her kitchen experimenting with new dishes. They like to travel together and are planning a trip to England this summer.




Carewest George Boyack hangs up the hammers for a while!



BEST PRACTICES CONFERENCE PLANNED FOR SPRING

The Calgary Regional Health Authority will host a 'best practices' conference called *Healthy Aging*, *Strategic Directions and Future Actions* at the Coast Plaza Hotel on June 21 and 22, 2001.

The conference will address the nine strategic directions stemming from the Broda Report – a provincial government report that addresses the health and wellness needs of Alberta's seniors. The strategic directions also form the frame work for ten-year continuing care plans to be developed by each of the regions.

Conference organizers are hoping to attract 300 participants with an interest in seniors' health. Michael Decter, an economist, author and Chairperson of the National Board for the Canadian Institute for Health Information will deliver the key note address.

Conference organizers say there is still time to submit proposals for presentation for poster displays.

Because I was so far away I had to rely a lot on phone calls to see how dad was doing. I always received kind words and honesty.



Renovations Galore at Carewest Sarcee


Construction is well underway for the new regional Comprehensive Community Care program opening at Carewest Sarcee.
