Letter to Larry Konschuk, Chairman, Board of Directors, Carewest May 11, 1998 Dear Sir:

Two weeks ago today I placed my husband Bill in your Glenmore Park facility. I want you to know that I am ever so grateful for the caring and kind staff you have in the G-2 south unit. In particular I'd like to mention Gwen Nicholls and Marlene Collins. They not only have shown a great deal of concern and empathy for Bill but for me as well.

I can't tell you how much I appreciated their coming out to our home and getting to know a bit about Bill's routine and how little he was able to converse with others. They came on a Wednesday morning and asked if I could bring him in to your facility on Monday a.m. Your staff's handling of this situation was so compassionate - it gave me the weekend to get used to the idea and to get his things together and labeled. By the time Monday rolled around, I was mentally prepared to take him to Glenmore Park.

In the first day and a half after I took him in I received five phone calls from the staff keeping me informed as to how they were managing with Bill and asking if I was coping okay. They were as genuinely concerned about me as they were about Bill. They had a rough first week with him but they have accomplished miracles in that time and he seems to be settling in now. I too have come to terms with my guilt and sadness. I realize how fortunate my family and I are to have him in such a well-run facility with a top-notch staff whose personalities are so warm and so sensitive to everyone's personal needs. They appear to me to be very knowledgeable in every respect and able to cope instantly with any crisis that arises. My husband likes the staff and I can't praise them enough. I thought you should know how pleased and thankful I am he is in your facility and that the staff should get the recognition they deserve.

I toured eight continuing care centres some time ago and it didn't take me long to realize that Carewest's were the finest in the city. I lucked out in getting him placed in Glenmore Park. I was so worried when I put him in but there is no doubt in my mind whatsoever but that he'll have the best of care in a warm and caring home-like atmosphere.





A vitamin for cancer

After years of hearing how certain foods and food additives can contribute to the development of cancer, it is relief to learn that certain vitamins appear to offer protection against cancer. Dozens of studies ... have now shown that beta carotene, which the body converts into vitamin A, may inhibit the development of cancer and cataracts, as well as enhance the immune system ... The best sources of beta carotene are orange and yellow fruits and vegetables and leafy greens ... including sweet potatoes, carrots, dandelion greens, kale, spinach, mango, winter squash, broccoli ...

The lean green nutrition machine Yes, there is such a thing as health food, and its name is broccoli. One serving of fresh broccoli (one cup chopped) gives you about 90% of your daily requirement of vitamin A (in the form of beta carotene), 200% of vitamin C, 6% of niacin, 10% of calcium, 10% of thiamin, 10% of phosphorus, and 8% of iron. It is also rich in potassium and has 5 grams of protein. Wait, there's more. One serving provides about 25% of your daily fiber needs – a critical area in which the American diet is usually deficient. Moreover, studies have found that broccoli is one of the vegetables that may protect against certain forms of cancer. All this and only 45 calories!

ACCREDIT TION '99



In June 1999, Carewest along with the CRHA Acute Care, Forest Grove, Beverly, Extendicare, Mayfair and Glamorgan continuing care centres will take part in Accreditation.

Accreditation means following self-assessment standards developed by the Canadian Council on Health Services Accreditation (CCHSA). The CCHSA surveyors visit our sites and interview our Accreditation teams. The Accreditation process has changed from the days when the focus was on written policies and procedures. It now focuses more on teamwork to

support care and services, quality of services to residents, clients and staff, and quality improvement within our organization.
