Message from Brenda: We're 'Keeping In Touch'

Years from now well into the future, people will probably say the most common word of this decade was 'change.' Carewest has certainly been part of this change. In fact, over the last few years we've changed everything from our corporate name (formerly Calgary Hospital District No. 7) to adding several new facilities and services

along the way. Royal Park, Nickle House, Signal Pointe and the new Colonel Belcher are all additions in the last four years, along with our Rehabilitation and Recovery Units and Transition Units.

As many of you know, Carewest is now undergoing another major change – the integration of Carewest Support Services into the Calgary Health Region. This includes Human Resources (Payroll and Scheduling), Finance, Capital Planning/Housing, Purchasing/Stores, Communications and Information Technology. While some services will integrate quicker than others, by the end of the fiscal year (March 31st, 2002) the plan is for most Carewest Support Services to be integrated with the Calgary Health Region. There are no plans at this point for the future of the Administrative Building.

Why is this happening? Because the Calgary Health Region is looking at ways of reducing duplication of services, and sharing expertise and resources throughout the region. Like other health regions in Alberta, Calgary is facing significant financial pressures. The amalgamation of Carewest Support Services is seen as one of many ways to increase overall efficiency.

I have been holding weekly 'Keeping In Touch' meetings with Carewest Support Staff to explain the overall review of Administrative and Support Services in the Calgary Health Region and more specifically the integration of Carewest Support Services. These meetings are very well attended and while sometimes there isn't a lot of new information to share, I am committed to keeping everyone up-to-date and providing a forum to ask questions directly.

While Carewest Support Services is changing, it will be 'business as usual' at each of the care centres. Residents and their families will notice few if any changes; our commitment to high standards of care remains the same. For the Health of It ...



November is Diabetes Awareness Month...

Did you know that two million Canadians live with diabetes? This chronic and debilitating disease is the leading cause of death by disease in Canada and regardless of whether you are male or female, your risk for getting it increases with age.

What is diabetes? It is a disease in which your body cannot properly store and use glucose-your body's source of fuel that you get from food. How does insulin fit in? To use glucose your body needs insulin, a hormone that is made by a gland in your body called the pancreas. Without it glucose builds up in your blood, causing high "blood sugar" levels. This can leave you feeling tired, thirsty, moody, hungry, having to urinate frequently, experiencing blurred vision and frequent infections. If you are experiencing any of these symptoms contact your physician.

What can you do about it? While there is no cure, you can help prevent complications of this serious disease by:

√ Eating a balanced diet,

√ Losing weight if you are overweight,

√ Getting regular exercise, √ Reducing stress,

√ Monitoring your blood sugar, blood pressure and cholesterol,

√ Getting your eyes and teeth examined annually,

√ Quitting smoking,

√ Taking care of your feet.

Did you know?

Carewest has a new Blood and Body Fluids Exposure Policy and Procedure.

Under the mandate of her role as the Occupational Health & Safety Advisor, Roxanne McKendry needs to make staff aware of the policies and procedures that could impact on their health and welfare. One of these is the new Blood and Body Fluids Exposure Policy and Procedure. This can be found in the Carewest Administrative Manual under Health and Safety.

The key difference is that all employees will be encouraged to go for treatment at the Calgary Health Region's 8th and 8th clinic. The reason we have chosen this clinic is so that our employees get the most current testing, treatment and follow-up care that is needed after a significant blood and body fluids exposure. The physicians at the 8th and 8th clinic deal with other employees from the Calgary Health Region, as well as other emergency responders in the community. They use the most current treatment protocols and have access to the Medical Officer of Health. Employees can be seen 24 hours a day.




We're In the News!
