SOME THOUGHTS FROM MIKE'S CORNER

It's hard to believe that six months have passed by and it's time again for another series of Town Hall sessions. Although we haven't nailed down dates at this time, the middle of November looks like a strong possibility. We'll let you know the dates as soon as possible.

I look forward to Town Halls because they give me an opportunity to explain our plans for the future and to reflect on what we've accomplished to date. But more importantly, Town Halls give me a chance to listen to you, to hear your suggestions and concerns first hand.

To me, it's important that our Town Halls are relaxed and fairly informal. My goal is to encourage an atmosphere where people feel welcome to speak out and to take part in the conversation. I also want to be sure you find my presentation interesting and informative. Please be sure to speak out if there is something that is not clear and needs repeating. These are information sessions and it is important that the information is clear enough for you to be able to share with others who cannot attend.

While it's important to hear from you, I'd also like to assure you that we're making every effort to act on many of your concerns and suggestions. For example, we heard clearly that staffing and scheduling (getting the right people to the right job at the right time) were key concerns. While this is a complex organizationwide issue, we've made some significant improvements with the help of Bob Gerst, an expert in this area. George Boyack is now a non-smoking facility and we're well on the way to making much needed improvements to our laundry services.

In previous Town Halls many of you have asked about our new programs and facilities especially about Signal Pointe and Royal Park. You've also expressed lots of interest in renovations taking place at all sites. Town Halls are an opportunity to get the latest information.

As usual, we'll have question boxes and flip charts for you to write down your questions ahead of time if you wish. Of course, you are most welcome to ask your questions directly from the floor.

Please be sure to try and take the time to come to a Town Hall at your site. We'll also be visiting the sites in the evening so we can reach as many staff members as possible. Watch out for more details in Carewrite and bulletins at your site.

Staff Profile

Sabina Maye, Activity Convenor, Carewest Dr. Vernon Fanning Centre

Work is a party for Sabina Maye, Activities Convenor at Carewest Dr. Vernon Fanning Centre — dinner parties, stampede parties, Christmas parties — all carefully organized and coordinated for Fanning's residents. For many wheelchair bound residents, entertainment and social activities are as important as quality nursing care, but quite distinct from recreational therapy activities, which have a therapeutic aspect to them.

Sabina sees to it that each nursing unit has a stampede barbecue, with entertainment. She books space at Gulf Canada Square for all Carewest residents to go and watch the stampede parade, and then makes sure enough buses are booked and meals are ordered. An Octoberfest dance for 130 people, most of them in wheelchairs? No problem. Wheelchair dancing is fun, Sabina tells me. One of her favourite events is an evening of dinner and entertainment — with

the coliseum set up like a fancy restaurant. At Christmas there is a talent show, with skits, instrumental groups and singing. "It's amazing how much talent we have right here in this building. It's good — really good," Sabina says.

Little extras like centerpieces and tablecloths for dinner parties are Sabina's responsibility, as well as necessary details such as posters on the bulletin boards, finding volunteers, and assuring there are enough napkins and cutlery for diners.

Events are planned on a monthly basis. Twelve major events are decided upon by Sabina and the Team Leaders from each unit. Most large events are planned three months in advance. In addition, Sabina organizes three or four smaller events for each month, many of them volunteered by the community — such as school bands or choirs. She coordinates students from Colonel McLeod and Sir John Franklin Junior High schools who visit with residents, and sets up visits from Brownie and Guide groups.

Starting next week, the Infection Control RN's and Team Leaders will be giving Carewest staff shots. The Incentive Program is back bigger and better, thanks to Management Partners and Dr. Aldridge, Carewest Medical Director. The following prizes are being donated and will be drawn for from the Carewest - wide list of participants:

- · six draws for days off with pay
- · six draws for one month free parking
- · a cash donation of \$100

All you have to do to enter is to get a shot of the vaccine in your arm. Your name will then be entered in the draw. The most important bonus however is decreased resident illness and death. It has been shown that when a high per centage of staff are immunized there is a significant decrease in influenza in frail elderly residents. So, you not only protect yourself, your family and co-workers but most importantly those you care for - your residents.

The Facts:

- · Influenza is a major killer in Canada each year
- · Healthcare workers are potentially capable of transmitting influenza to those at high risk
- · The vaccine is offered free of charge from Population Health
- · It takes two weeks for the immune response to develop after the vaccine is given
- · Allergic reactions are rare, the vaccine is not live
- · The vaccine is safe for pregnant women
- · You must wait two weeks to donate blood
