#### SOME THOUGHTS FROM MIKE'S CORNER

Great news for Carewest! The Canadian Council on Health Services Accreditation has awarded the Calgary Regional Health Authority a three-year accreditation following its June 9 – 18 survey. Carewest took part in this voluntary self assessment and peer review in order to understand our strengths — and more importantly – opportunities for improvement. It appears we're on the right track as the final report offers no recommendations for change.

Getting ready for Accreditation involved a lot of work from Carewest employees, volunteers, residents and their families, community representatives and members of our Board. We were given a brief verbal summary of the findings on June 19th and just recently received the full written report.

The report covers a wide range of areas within care, housing and hospitality. It gives special mention to our employee recognition program called Making A Difference! As well as our innovative recruitment and retention strategies, education and wellness programs and our employee survey to measure staff, resident and family satisfaction. "It is noteworthy that volunteers contribute to 150 different program areas throughout the organization," the report states. Our renovation projects are "an excellent example of demonstrating commitment to improving quality of lifestyle for clients."

Opportunities for collaborating in organization-wide planning, decision making and problem solving were also highlighted along with our preventive mainte-

nance program "which goes beyond industry standards." Top marks as well for our Balanced Score Card (a way of monitoring organizational performance.) The Accreditation team was particularly impressed with the standard of care throughout our organization and the dedication and commitment of staff and volunteers.

On behalf of the Carewest Board, I'd like to extend my thanks and congratulations to everyone who took part in Accreditation and indeed to all staff who contributed to this significant improvement. This was an opportunity to take a good look at how we go about our business. From all accounts, it seems we're on the right track.



#### Staff Profile: Arnie Chamberlain: a Ministry of Presence

Arnie Chamberlain, Pastoral Care Coordinator and Chaplain for Carewest Dr. Vernon Fanning Centre and Carewest Sarcee, has been a familiar smiling face at Carewest for the past nine years. He loves pastoral care because it gives him a chance to use his greatest gift—the ability to relate to individuals and small groups of people who have a variety of spiritual and religious beliefs.

"Pastoral care is journeying with people through all of the adventures and trials and celebrations of life, and being one representative of God with people," Arnie says. "It involves a celebration of God's presence and a celebration of who we are. This is a Ministry of Presence, and it's an honour and a joy to be present with people and be a part of their lives ... nobody is alone, we are all journeying together."

Arnie helps many residents maintain a quality of life as they live with illness. "The courage that I've seen in people who live with MS or cancer or brain injuries is remarkable. I learn so much from them," he says. Arnie is available for all residents, families, volunteers and staff at Carewest. He has baptized staff, and has performed weddings for staff, and for children and grandchildren of residents. He has conducted personal funerals for residents, in addition to arranging regular memorial services that acknowledge the life journeys of all former residents.



Arnie holds non-denominational chapel services, as well as Fun With Faith groups where people sing a lot of songs and sometimes bring in scriptures. "Fun, Faith, and Feeling—they are the good F words!" Arnie says with his usual long and hearty laugh.

Arnie's job may be to give support, but he in turn feels supported by friends throughout Carewest, including his supervisor, Debby Dubord, and others that he works with in Resident Services.

Time away from Carewest is well-spent. He especially enjoys volunteering as Financial Trustee for a man who needs this help in order to manage in the community. Simple outings together, like a trip for a haircut, often end up being fun. Arnie's life is also enriched by the adult singles group he belongs to. He loves the monthly meetings, speakers and great potlucks. Members really care for one another, he says. In yet another role, Arnie is Chair of the Calgary Foothills Resource Store, a bookstore associated with the United Church. On top of all this, he still finds time to swim, go for walks and bike rides, and attend live theatre. At home, supervised by his cat Felix, Arnie builds model ships, reads short stories (especially W.P. Kinsella's) and listens to a broad variety of music.

Arnie fits an incredible amount of fun and caring into each day that God has given him, and this self-proclaimed optimist and people-person wouldn't have it any other way.

Planned Giving - make the most of your estate while supporting a cause you believe in.

#### What is planned giving?

Planned giving is when you make a commitment now, to donate a fixed amount at a later date. It offers you tax effective planning which can have substantial benefits for you, for your estate and for your favorite charities including Carewest. Traditionally, many of us assume the only gift possible is an outright gift of cash, when in fact, you can plan to support the ongoing and future work of Carewest and other charities through bequests by Will, securities, life insurance policies, property, special trusts and annuities.

Like most donors, you probably write a cheque once or twice a year to your favorite charities. These gifts are uncomplicated, they are certainly appreciated by the charities and they do result in a tax credit. However, writing a cheque is not necessarily the most cost-effective way to make a charitable gift. The following brief summary on charitable bequests will give you some information on ways you can maximize the amount of money available to your heirs, while providing a valuable gift to a cause you believe in.

#### What is a bequest?

The most common type of planned gift is a bequest by Will. A bequest is a gift of personal property which you make through a Will, including cash stocks, bonds, real estate or items such as art, jewelry, stamp collections or books. A charitable bequest is simply when the recipient is a charity.

A "specific bequest" is the gift of one or more specific items, or a set amount of money. For example, leaving the sum of \$50,000 is a specific bequest.

A "residual bequest" is the gift of what's left of your estate after the payment of debts and the distribution of other gifts. For example, you might leave specific gifts to family, friends, etc. and the residue to a charity.

A "conditional bequest" – a gift that depends on some other event. A

conditional bequest would, for example, leave a gift to a charity if another of your beneficiaries does not survive you.

People often think only wealthy people have an estate, but that's not so. A home, a bank account, cars and personal possessions all make up your estate.

Carewest often receives bequests and donations from deceased individuals who wish for a portion of their estate to go towards care of seniors. Most of these bequests come from former residents or from families of former residents.
