PLANS FOR SHORT STAY AND REHABILITATION PROGRAMS MOVING FORWARD

In a recent issue of Carewrite we told you about the plans to introduce new programs and expand some existing ones at Carewest. The next stage in the process – planning for renovation and new equipment – is underway. Human Resources has also developed a staffing plan to accommodate the new programs and Fran Jost, our Resident Move Coordinator has been busy working with residents and families affected by the changes.

These programs have one thing in common — to provide short and long-term rehabilitation and recuperation for people before they return home or to another continuing care setting. The majority of clients will be coming to us following a stay in hospital.

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Regional Short Stay Transition Unit

Cross Bow's Regional Short Stay Program will undergo an expansion. This program is primarily for people who have been discharged from hospital but need more time to recuperate before returning home or to a continuing care setting. The unit provides assessment, therapy and a variety of other services including social work, nutritional support – and anything else necessary for a successful transition. The same type of program will be offered on a smaller scale at Glenmore Park and the Fanning Centre.

Rehabilitation Programs

Carewest is also working closely with the Calgary Regional Health Authority (CRHA) to introduce a Neuro Rehabilitation Program at the Fanning Centre (mainly for people recuperating from a stroke) and a Musculo Skeletal Rehabilitation Program at Glenmore Park (for people recuperating from orthopedic surgery). Both programs will officially open in January, 2001. In the Spring, Sarcee will become home to Calgary's first Comprehensive

Community Care Program (C3). This is an all inclusive home care and day support program for seniors who would otherwise be living in a continuing care centre.

These exciting forward thinking initiatives are part of the CRHA's overall Business Plan. The Region is committed to providing seniors with the most appropriate health care in the most appropriate settings. Busy, high tech hospitals are not always the most suitable places to recuperate after the 'acute phase' of an illness.

Renovations and equipment


In the months to come minor renovations will be happening at each of the targeted sites to make way for the new programs. These include modifications to therapy areas, tub and shower rooms, as well as pharmacy and storage areas. The rehabilitative focus of the programs also calls for new equipment and supplies. Carewest will share some costs with the Calgary Regional Health Authority.

Sarcee Resident Council President Treats Staff



Colonel Don Ethell Honoured For Peacekeeping

Congratulations to Col. Don Ethell who was selected along with Maj. Bruce Henwood from Calgary to receive Canada's first peacekeeping medal at a ceremony in Ottawa on September 6, 2000. Col. Ethell is a member of the Colonel Belcher Care Centre Project Advisory Committee and the Friends of the Colonel Belcher whose members raise funds for the project.

Col. Ethell and Major Henwood joined 85 other serving or retired Canadian Armed Forces members, police officers and civilians from across Canada to receive the Canadian Peacekeeping Service Medal. The medal was presented by Gov. Gen. Adrienne Clarkson, commander-in-chief of the Forces at the peacekeeping monument.

"It's a distinct honour to be selected to represent many, many Canadians who have served on peacekeeping missions," he said. A 39-year veteran, Col. Ethell has taken part in 14 peacekeeping tours over eight years.
